Formerly a plant nursery, ater Helping Hand Hardware. As early as the 1930s, a separate building held the Hormuth's Service Station, Drycleaners, and

Liquor Store.

18 Former location of a pool hall and beer joint with several owners throughout the years. Often called Joe's Drive In.



Dairy Queen and Mini-Mart area.

Former location of several beer joints and pool halls. One was the Wooden Indian. Others in this area




included the Henry Strey store, Kiolbassa Feed and Supply Store, Ahrens Feed and Supply, and the home of Willie Witte.

McGarrell Orthodontist Office.

Former site of the La Vernia United Methodist Church chapel, office and classrooms.



The chapel faced Chihuahua St. and was moved to its current location on FM 775 on Aug. 8, 1996.



In 1891, the original 21 church building, called Rector Chapel, was moved two miles by oxen from FM 2772 to this location.

It burned to the ground on Oct. 13, 2010, and was rebuilt. The bell from the tower was donated and moved to the La Vernia Heritage Museum.



along Chihuahua Street built c. 1930-40s. The bottom photo shows the section built by E. O. Koepp, Sr. across from his then home at Chihuahua and Crews Sts.

Chihuahua Street was named for the historic Chihuahua Road, a trade route between the silver mines in Chihuahua, Mexico and the shipping ports on the Gulf of Mexico. As late as 1878, silver from Chihuahua was still traded in La Vernia. The street was the original downtown of La Vernia. When Highway 87 was completed in 1960, the activity on Chihuahua Street was forever changed.

In this guide, we have focused on the early businesses along central Chihuahua Street. Private homes have been and continue to be present along the street. Please do not trespass on private property.



the H. C. Schraub General Merchandise store. A portion of the building has been removed. It held Mary Knoll's Beer Joint and later, the Ervin Lenz Café. As early as 1925,



the two-story Racket Store (right) also existed at this site along with the second location of Mary's Beauty Shop and the Shafenburg Barber
